WILLIAMSBURG IS SITE FOR 'TODAY' SHOW

The "Today" show, NBC's morning news program, will broadcast from Colonial Williamsburg on Wednesday as part of its "Today Takes on the Battleground States" series.

Matt Lauer and Al Roker will broadcast on Duke of Gloucester Street. The program airs at 7 a.m.

Lauer is scheduled to interview Gov. Timothy M. Kaine and U.S. Rep. Eric Cantor, R-7th District, NBC said. He will report on a customized NBC News poll for the state of Virginia on the presidential election.

Luke Russert is to report on the youth vote after visiting with University of Virginia students.

Lauer and Roker will also be joined by Colonial African American singers, and Roker will do a cooking segment on Colonial food.

In covering election battleground states, the show also will air from Philadelphia on Monday; Tampa, Fla., on Tuesday; and Detroit on Thursday, the day before the first presidential debate, in Oxford, Miss.

Also Wednesday, Lauer will stop by Norfolk to speak with Teens With a Purpose, a group of teen peer educators, according to the AIDS Care Center for Education and Support Services. ACCESS, which works with the teens, will host a lunch with Roker at noon at Enrico's Ristorante on Colley Avenue, a news release said.

Friends of the dance and martial arts enthusiast described Landowski as a girl with the ready smile who was always willing to help other people.

"She hugged people she didn't know," said Chris Sawyer, a Wilson junior. "She kissed people on the cheek she didn't know. She would always tell people that she loved them."

Hailey Foster, a junior, said, "Wilson seems a little darker without her."

Ann Hill, who lives in Suffolk, attended the walk with her granddaughter, Nikki Jones.

Jones knew Landowski from vacation Bible school. Hill said she came because a lot of girls are in her family.

"We feel for the parents," Hill said. "No parent should have to go through that."

The walk began about 10 a.m. Landowski's mother and stepfather, Angela and Chris Shortt, and brother Corey Landowski led the procession, along with Landowski's former dance instructor, Kelli Derrick.
